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TEACHING

- 2026 **CMC, “Blaming Charlotte Brontë”:** “Anybody may blame me who likes,” remarked Jane Eyre in 1847. In reply, Virginia Woolf wondered in 1929, “What were they blaming Charlotte Brontë for?” Brontë has often been treated as interchangeable with her characters—blamed and celebrated for their most controversial ideas—since early readers of *Jane Eyre* developed a fan theory that Jane herself was the real-life writer behind Brontë’s penname, Currer Bell. This course considers why Brontë’s novels provoke such impassioned, imaginative responses. Students read the books behind *Jane Eyre*, peruse Brontë’s childhood manuscripts, analyze her semi-autobiographical *Villette*, and engage with some of her iconic interlocutors.
- 2026 **CMC, “British Writers II”:** After Milton and through the onset of Modernism, British writers invented genres and crafted texts that continue to shape our culture. Their readers experienced the rise of the novel genre, an explosion of periodical prose, the poems of Wordsworth, and the essays of Woolf. How are we to understand the innovation and influence of these works in their own time and in our present? This course—the second in CMC’s required sequence for Literature majors—investigates how British writers from the late-seventeenth through the early-twentieth centuries crafted narratives about their past and present that, in effect, shaped their future.
- 2025 **CMC, “Silly Novels by Lady Novelists?”:** In 1856, George Eliot’s essay, “Silly Novels by Lady Novelists,” playfully eviscerated her female colleagues and provoked two related questions: what were the literary criteria for evaluating novels, and what had the novel genre to do with gender? These questions guide students’ readings of novels and criticism by Sarah Fielding, Samuel Johnson, Charlotte Lennox, Frances Burney, Jane Austen, Elizabeth Gaskell, and Anonymous Ladies. From 1750-1850, these authors were experimenting with definitions of “novel” and imagining how this new genre might reshape gender norms. The novel genre may have been silly at times, but lady novelists were all too serious.
- 2025 **CMC, First-Year Writing Seminar, “The Young Adult Novel”:** This course examines what a YA novel is and how this genre experiments with its own literary and cultural connotations. Each unit addresses a different type of YA story, pairing historical texts with contemporary novels that test the limits of their subgenres. We read *Alice’s Adventures with Seraphina* as adventure stories, *Anne of Green Gables* with *Akata Witch* as school stories, and *Little Women* with *The Henna Wars* as love stories. In close reading and research papers, students analyze understudied YA novels.
- 2022-25 **Harvard, Senior Thesis Co-Advisor in English:** I co-advised five senior theses with Professors Deidre Lynch and Nicholas Watson. The research topics included modernist influenza novellas, feminist criticism, Victorian maternal character “types,” gothic fiction, Helen Oyeyemi’s novels, and foster children in Jane Austen’s novels.
- 2024 **Harvard, Junior Tutorial, “Feminist YA”:** Created a writing-intensive course culminating in a 25-page paper. Our novels ranged from the 18th-21st centuries, and our theoretical approach melded literary history, feminist theory, gender studies, critical

- race theory, media studies, and book history. We explored what a “young adult novel” is, how this genre (or genre cluster) raises questions about female identity, how scholars write about YA, and why these texts are so often banned in schools. Spring Semester.
- 2023 **Harvard, Literary Forms, Teaching Fellow:** I wrote all the paper prompts and exams, taught two weekly seminars, and assisted Prof. Nicholas Watson in two weekly lectures for this foundational course, which all majors are required to take, and which was overenrolled. Authors ranged from Chaucer to Du Bois, to Ishiguro. Spring Semester.
- 2022 **Harvard, Junior Tutorial, “Sex and the Series”:** This writing-intensive course concluded with a 25-page paper. Our discussions fused novel theory, feminist criticism, queer theory, the history of the book, and adaptation studies. We considered how the serial form of the Victorian novel and early-2000’s TV invites extended, fluid, and critical thought about gender, sexuality, and identity. We interrogated when gossip, daily life, and pop culture count as “Art”—and for whom? We read four novels, pairing *Bleak House* with *Gilmore Girls*, *Vanity Fair* with *Bridgerton* and *Sex & The City*, *Cranford* with *Grace and Frankie*, and *Middlemarch* with *Gossip Girl*. Fall Semester.
- 2021-22 **Harvard, Humanities [10a](#) & [10b](#), Teaching Fellow and Exam Author:** I taught one seminar discussion and one Expository Writing Lab per week, for which I wrote and commented on students’ responses to Canvas prompts, delivered core writing curriculum, moderated seminar discussion, and graded essays. I was also hired to write the midterm and final exams. I earned two **Bok Center Awards for Distinction in Teaching**. Supervised by Professors Glenda Carpio (fall) and Jay Harris (spring).
- 2018-19 **KCL & UNC Chapel Hill, “[Literature and Diplomacy](#),” TA & RA:** Taught with former ambassador Sir Christopher Meyer and Prof. Ted Leinbaugh; co-authored the curriculum; led visits to British Museum; co-coordinated “Global Forum on Brexit.”
